

Cub Scout Day camp is an economical way for cubs to have a great camp experience. The cost is low because the camp is staffed by volunteers.

The registration fee of \$65.00 includes T-shirt, camp patch, insurance, daily park admission, and all supplies.

Registration

Registration forms will be published in *The Digital Eagle*, and will also be available at the Scout Office and from unit leaders. This form will also be posted on the Vulcan District Web Site (www.vulcandistrict.org). Registration forms and fees should be returned to the Scout Office.

The registration fee is \$65.00 per scout for registration forms received by the Scout Office, with a minimum deposit of \$25.00 no later than 4 weeks before the start of camp (June 22). A \$25.00 late fee will be charged for applications received after that date. The balance of the registration fee is due by 2 weeks before camp.

In addition, adult volunteers working all week at camp will be eligible for a registration fee discount of \$30.00 for one son, and a discount of \$20.00 for a second son. Eligibility must be verified by the Camp director.

Partial refunds will be considered if submitted in writing at least one week prior to camp.



2009 Vulcan District Cub Scout Day Camp Webelos II Adventure July 20-24, 2009

Cub Scout Day Camp, Webelos II Adventure, is a new opportunity for upcoming Webelos II Scouts to enjoy the facilities at Oak Mountain State Park while they participate in a variety of fun-filled activities designed for advancement and achievement.

Oak Mountain State Park is located 15 miles south of Birmingham near Pelham, AL just off I-65 at Exit 246.

How does it work? What is this camp like?

Cub Scout Day Camp, Webelos II Adventure, is a new 5 day twilight program operating from 4:00 - 8:30, Monday through Thursday and closing with an overnight campout on Friday night. This program is open to Scouts who are entering the 5th Grade (Webelos II Scouts). There is no provision for younger siblings to attend this program.

Unlike the traditional Cub Scout Day Camp, the Webelos II Adventure is a new program designed as an introduction to some of the exciting outdoor adventures found in the Boy Scouting program. In addition to working on their Readyman and Outdoorsman activity badges, the boys will participate in other activities including shooting sports, camp cooking, fire building, all designed for fun and adventure.

When the boys arrive at Camp in the afternoon, they will report to their own area, while the daytime Cub Scout Day Camp is in progress. Following an opening ceremony at 4:00, they will begin their daily scheduled activities. There will be a break for dinner. Closing ceremony is at 8:30, after which everyone heads home to rest up for the next day.

The Friday overnight program also begins at 4:00, but will be at a different location within the park. The program concludes Saturday morning.

NOTES TO PARENTS

While the Camp program is under the direction of Day Camp staff, supervision of the boys remains the primary responsibility of Walking Den Leaders supplied by the Pack or families. Normally, Packs are expected to supply one Walking Den Leader each day for every 5 boys they send to camp. This means that one parent should plan to attend camp at least one evening during this week. Parents should understand the need for this commitment before they sign their boy(s) up to attend camp.

Additionally, for the Friday overnight program, each Webelos Scout must be under the direct supervision of a specific adult. In most cases this will be his parent or guardian. If the scout's parent or guardian can not attend, they must identify and approve a responsible adult to accompany him.

An important part of the Webelos II Adventure program is the opportunity for the boys to learn different ways to cook while camping. Some of the dinner meals will be prepared in camp, so scouts may not need to bring sack lunches and drinks to camp each day. The cost of these dinner meals is not included in the Camp registration fee, but will be announced prior to camp.

There will also be instruction on pocket knife safety (Whitlin' Chip). Pocket knives may be brought to camp only as required to participate in this activity
